The Sankofa Museum: America's Story Through the Eyes of Its People is a traveling educational exhibit that invites audiences to see history through an unfiltered lens. It is a journey across generations that preserves the truth of America's past while affirming the voices that helped shape its identity.

At a time when lessons about race, culture, and belonging are being questioned or removed from classrooms, the Sankofa Museum offers a space for truth to be seen, heard, and understood. It reminds us that the

study of history is not a political act but a moral one. By bringing authentic artifacts, documents, images, and firsthand accounts to life, the museum gives context to the struggles and triumphs that define the American experience.



This exhibit challenges audiences to reflect on what it means to protect truth in a nation that is still learning how to tell its full story. It honors the contributions and resilience of African Americans while asking all who attend to consider how understanding the past shapes a more united and informed future.

More than an educational display, the Sankofa Museum stands as a vital cultural resource in today's divided climate. It provides clarity where there is confusion, dialogue where there is silence, and evidence where there is denial.


About the Curator

Through her presentations, Angela connects past to present and shows how struggle and hope have always walked side by side in the American journey.

The Sankofa Museum: America's Story Through the Eyes of Its People is an essential teaching resource for colleges that want to strengthen historical literacy and civic understanding through evidence based learning. The museum complements classroom instruction by connecting primary sources, critical analysis, and cultural context in ways traditional materials cannot match.

Students engage directly with artifacts, documents, and firsthand accounts that connect the abstract with the actual, allowing them to

analyze and interpret the physical evidence of history. Faculty in history, sociology, communications, art, and American studies use Sankofa to enrich coursework, inspire discussion, and deepen understanding of how the African American experience shaped the nation.



Within higher education, where accuracy and relevance are essential, Sankofa provides clarity and depth. The exhibit encourages inquiry and reflection that align with academic engagement, cultural literacy, and civic responsibility while avoiding terminology that could be misinterpreted as political programming.

Campuses choose Sankofa because it unites scholarship with experience. It reminds students that understanding America requires examining the full scope of its people and their persistence and progress. Each presentation turns learning spaces into living laboratories of history and shared discovery.

Greetings Ms. Jennings.

As Director of Barry University's Africana Studies program, I am delighted to have had the opportunity for you to bring the Sankofa African American Mobile Museum to campus for two days and one night during Black History Month 2022. It is an event that forever changed me and how I direct students in the Africana Studies minor. I am more inclusive in my teaching practices of African American history and history of the African Diaspora.

I want you to know that the students in my African American psychology class were that helped you set up and take down the exhibit enjoyed the privilege of spending time with you. Ms. Jennings, I know they received nurturance and immediate mentorship over that short period of time. It was quality over quantity. We formed a family over those two days and cannot wait for you to return. The spirit of Ubuntu radiated throughout the university campus. My students and colleagues still talk about the exhibit. It is amazing how knowledge of self and learning history that is often neglected to be shared in public schools creates a sense of community.

Just so you know, on Day 1, the exhibit was open to the university, and over 250 students, faculty, and staff attended. That evening, the private event we hosted for 22 prospective donors to view the exhibit and enjoy your performance was well received. I believe it also was mind-altering. This private event allowed me to partner with a racial healing organization, South Florida People of Color, to facilitate a conversation about the exhibit's most shocking or emotional aspect. We ate and drank and talked. I know you were tired, as you had been there all day and night. Yet, no one seemed ready to leave. That is how remarkable the exhibit, the performance, and the conversation about race, history, and culture were for the intimate group.

According to the principal of one of the middle schools, "Ms. Angela Jennings and the Sankofa African American Museum on Wheels provided the opportunity for our students currently studying African-American history to expand their learning beyond the classroom walls. Additionally, our student members of the Black Culture Union were able to benefit from this in-person experience of having their culture brought to life."

Students from this middle school and another high school attended the exhibit on Day 2. There were over 120 students in total. For the remainder of Day 2, there was a large turnout with over

300 visitors, mostly Barry University faculty, staff, and students. When the museum exhibit shut down, faculty and staff who did not know the exhibit had ended stopped by to view it and were saddened that they had missed the exhibit.

Summarily, Barry University students were impressed with the remarkable inclusivity and diversity of the exhibit as it not only discussed slavery. It covered Caribbean and African history as well. I think there were many highlights; however, one that surprised most visitors was the hundreds of inventions created by Blacks. Many people did not know. There were many that I was not even aware of. Thus, the Sankofa African American Museum on Wheels deepened our understanding of African Diasporic culture and history.

Ms. Jennings, the Sankofa exhibition was a much-appreciated chance to share important African Diasporic works and historical artifacts.

As the Director of Africana Studies, it is my hope and my goal to seek funding to bring the exhibit back to Barry for a week. Two days was just not enough!
